

In order that everyone enjoy Manitoba's provincial parks, and to ensure that your camping activities do not disrupt the activities of others, the following campground rules must be observed. (Additional rules may be posted in campground offices).

Quiet time is 11 p.m. to 9 a.m. The use of items such as chain saws, radios, or generators during this time is prohibited. Only permit holders returning to their designated campsites are allowed into campgrounds after 11 p.m. Vehicles entering campgrounds may be restricted.

Disturbances: Excessive noise or disturbance that intrudes on other campers is not permitted. This includes damaging property, fighting, screaming, loud music, insulting or obscene language, drunkenness or other disturbances. Failure to comply with these rules will result in enforcement actions, which may include a public disturbance charge under the Park Activities Regulations (set fine of \$673) and/or being evicted from all provincial parks for a period of up to 21 days. More serious disturbances could result in a charge for breach of peace under the Criminal Code and/or a ban from all provincial parks for one year. No refund will be issued.

Consumption of Alcohol is only permitted on campsites. Certain group use areas and campsites remain liquor free all season.

Cannabis: The smoking and vaping of non-medical cannabis is prohibited in most areas of Manitoba provincial parks. This prohibition extends to campsites, cabins and yurts (both inside and outside) within government-operated provincial park campgrounds, as well as shared public spaces such as roadways, beaches, canoe routes, trails and remote outdoor locations including backcountry trails and campsites. The smoking and vaping of cannabis inside a tent, camper trailer or motor home

located on a campsite is also prohibited as is the smoking or vaping of cannabis in a motor vehicle or boat within a provincial park.

Authorized medical cannabis users may smoke or vape cannabis in outdoor public places in provincial parks except in the following locations: in campsites within government-operated provincial park campgrounds; within eight metres of a building to which the public has access; on, or within eight metres of, an outdoor patio or deck of a restaurant or lounge or other enclosed public place; in a playground; or within eight metres of a playground; on a beach; at an outdoor entertainment or sports venue, or within eight metres of those venues; and; in an outdoor structure with a roof or other cover to which members of the public have access, such as a covered outdoor picnic area, or within eight metres of such a structure.

Generators may not be used between 11 p.m. and 9 a.m. They may not be used if the permit holder or immediate family is not present on the site. Continuous generator use during the day is not allowed.

Persons on site cannot exceed six people or one family. The permit holder must be present on site. Guests must leave campsites by 11 p.m. The permit holder is responsible for the conduct of all persons using the site.

Equipment on campsite: Only one camping unit is permitted per site. If space allows, an additional tent and/or dining tent may be set up on the campsite. A boat or utility trailer is only permitted if space allows, as determined by an officer. Vertical tarps are not allowed.

Pets must be leashed, tied up or caged and under physical control at all times. Owners must clean up after their pets. Only two pets (cat or dog) are allowed inside cabins and

yurts that are designated as pet friendly. Never leave your pet unattended,

Check-in time is 4 p.m. Check-out time is 3 p.m. Times vary for group use, family vacation cabins and yurts.

Length of stay: From June 15 to August 15, no person or camping unit is allowed to occupy the same campsite for more than 21 consecutive days.

Temporary removal of camping unit:

A campsite is considered vacant if the camping unit is removed from the site. Permit holders operating truck campers and motor homes may temporarily vacate the campsite if the licence number of the unit is recorded on the permit, and the campground office is advised of the temporary departure.

Motor Vehicles': Only one vehicle per campsite unless approved by an officer. Guests must park vehicles in designated parking areas.

Wildlife: Do not feed or harass wild animals. Do not leave food, garbage or other attractants out. Report all bears to the campground office.

Campfires in designated fire pits only and must be extinguished when the site is unoccupied. Firewood, where provided, is for campsite permit holders' use only. Removal of cut firewood from the park, and cutting or gathering living or dead wood is prohibited.

Loaded Firearms cannot be carried or discharged within 300 metres of any developed area (campgrounds, roadways and designated trails). There may be park-specific restrictions.

Fireworks and sky lanterns are prohibited.

Off-road vehicles: (ORVs) such as ATVs/UTVs and dirt bikes are prohibited except on designated ORV trails and must meet The Off-Road Vehicles Act requirements.
